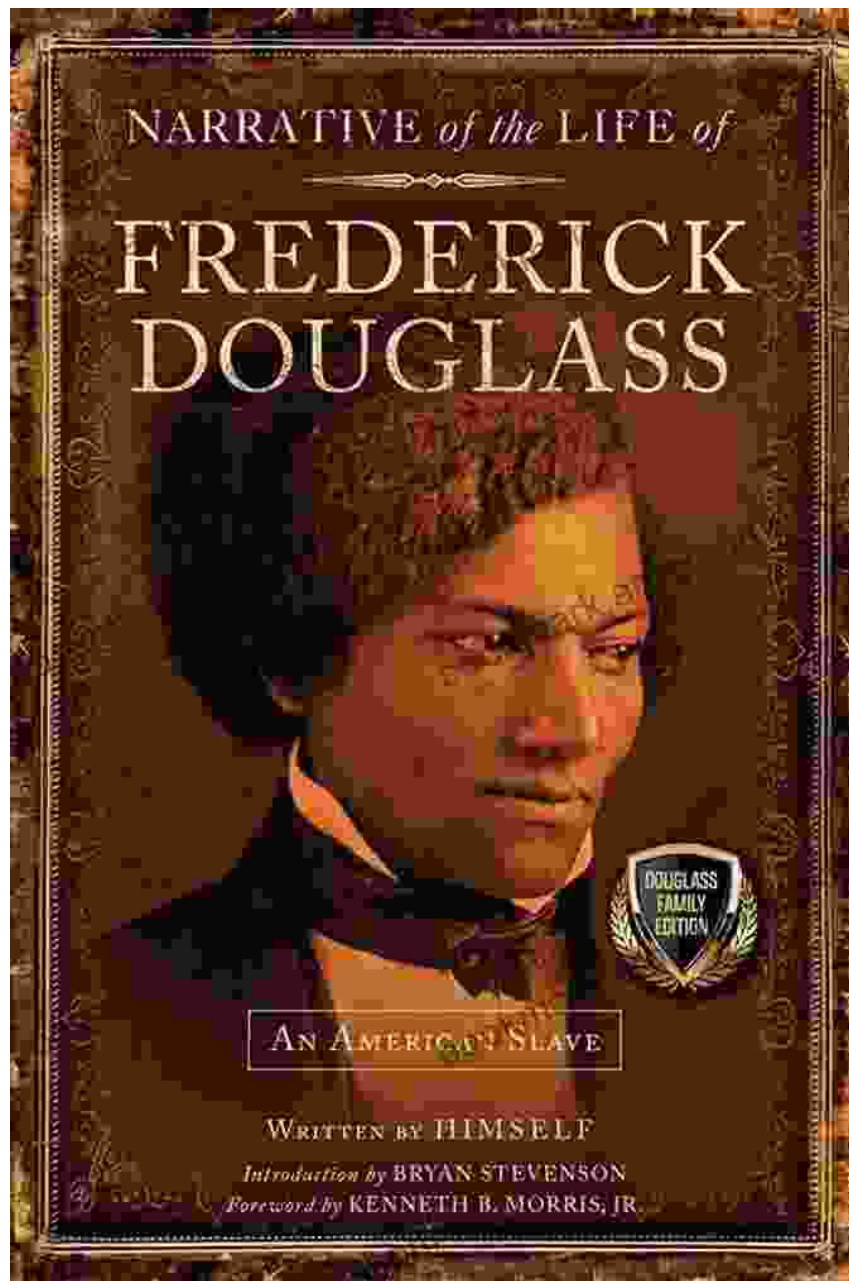


Karl Marx, author of Das Kapital

## Frederick Douglass (1818-1895)

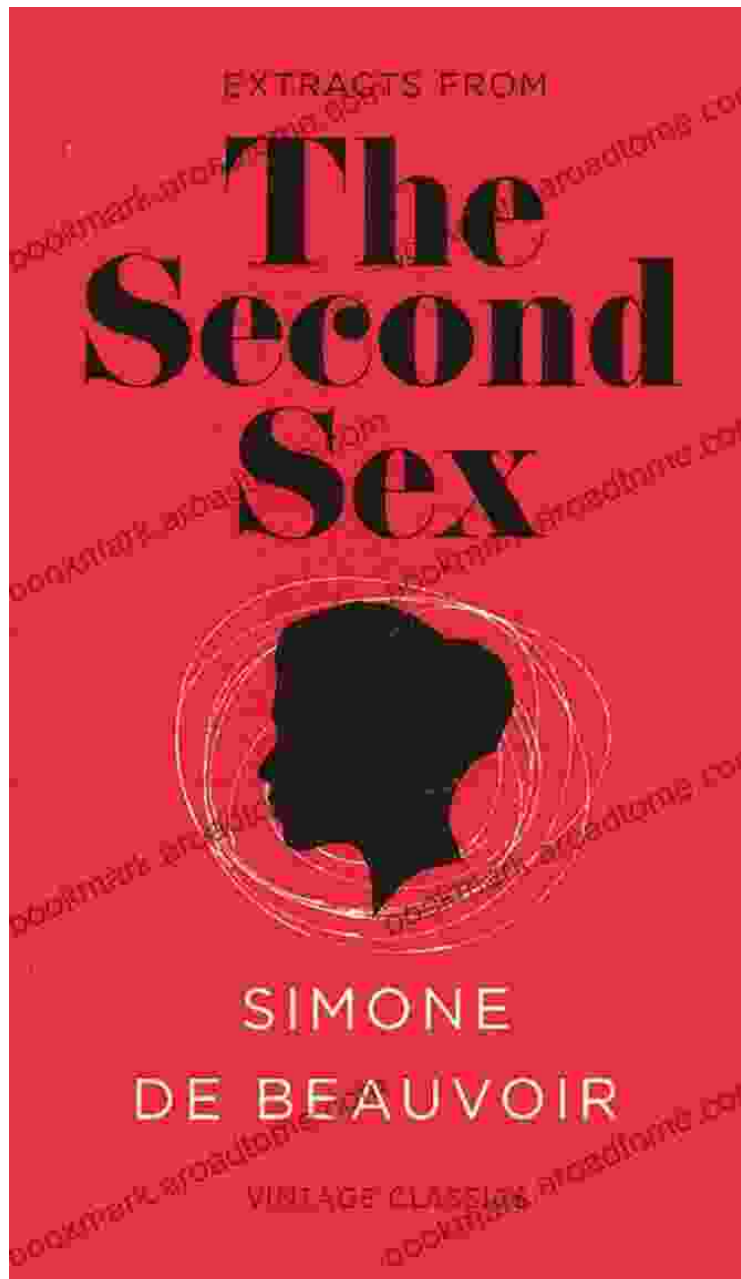

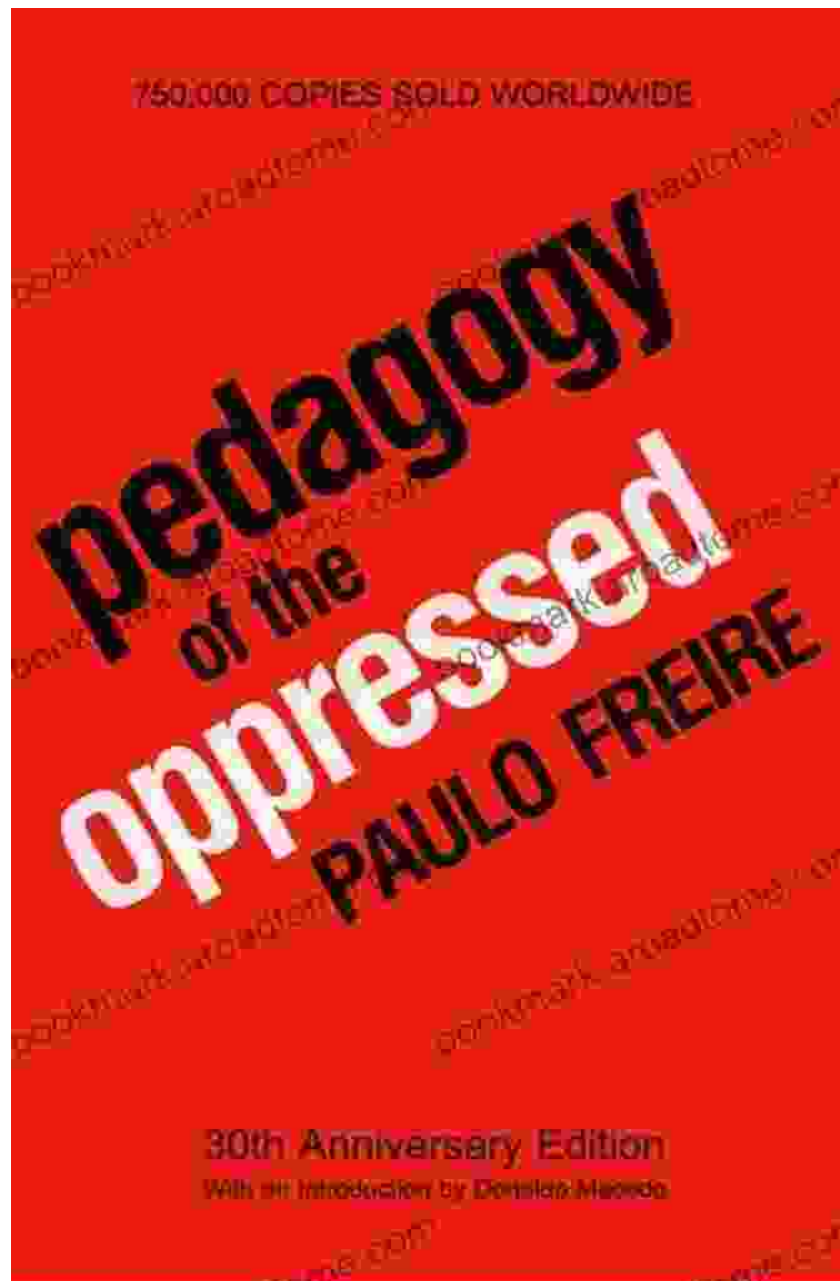


Simone de Beauvoir, author of *The Second Sex*

## Paulo Freire (1921-1997)

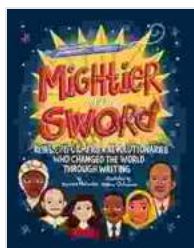

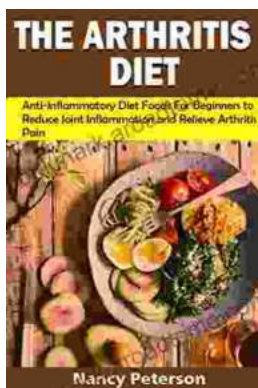

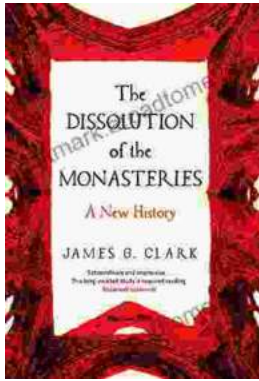
