Week 1

Text: Matthew 28:16–20

Topic(s): Evangelism, Discipleship, Mission

Big Idea of the Message: Jesus commanded Christians to live on mission through evangelism, discipleship, and community.

Application Point: Our vision within our local church should include making disciples, not just converts.

Introduction: What does it mean to receive a mission? We may think of a military call to action, or perhaps a top-secret message that will self-destruct in five seconds (like in the *Mission: Impossible* franchise). You might not be a Navy SEAL or a secret agent, but if you are a follower of Jesus, you have been assigned a mission, the most important one: to reach a lost world with the good news of God's love for them. As believers, we carry a message that can mean life or death for many. Jesus commanded Christians to live on mission through evangelism, discipleship, and community. Doing our part to fulfill his commission is the vision of this church.

Point #1: We Are Called to Go (vv. 16–19)

Explanation: Jesus gathered his followers for his last words on earth, a pretty important message. He gave them their final instructions before he ascended into heaven (vv. 16–17). Because Jesus has been given all authority (v. 18), he tells them to "go and tell the world." Because Jesus was victorious over sin and death, his disciples' mission was to go and make more disciples by telling them what Jesus has done (v. 19).

Illustration: For people who decide they can't leave town for vacation but still want to have a special time with family out of the normal routine by doing fun things and resting, they may choose to take a "staycation," a vacation in their hometown. Some ideas for a staycation include finding tourist attractions in your area and making a day trip, loading up on special treats and snacks, watching a family movie projected on a wall outside, and trying new restaurants out of the normal lineup. It's not about the location but about the quality time together. In the same way, many believers might think going on a mission trip is the only way to share the gospel with people who need to hear it. But we can stay in our home town and live on mission, too.

Application: Often, when we see the words "all nations" in this passage, we can be




5. Seeking Guidance

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
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
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
