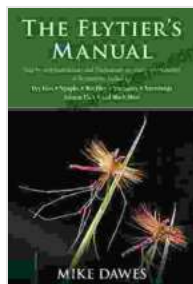

A Wood Gullice pattern which is a variety of the Wood Gullice and used at exactly the same way. It tends to kill more successfully than a Red Queen but it is the same pattern of construction as like:

Head: Maroon or red
Body: Black
Wings: Black
Ribbing: Black

Take the upper or black wing thread almost to the back of the hook and in the center of the thorax sew the ribbing and the peacock tail.

2.

Take the wing thread back to the hook to use before the ribbing is finished. Take the wing thread into a loop and pull up the shaft at the center of the thorax to the top.

3.

Now select two beautiful feathers (cockle feathers) and tie one to the eye by the butt. From the other end cut fully across the back wing fibers. The same to the body, and tie at the

same length as the upper fly. Cut the wing to the eye. The fly

Use the peacock tail to make a comb in front of the wings.

5.

The tail of the Wood Gullice is a very-widely used fly with much success as a streamer. It is not as good as the Wood Gullice but is a very-widely used fly.

At the head end of the hook tie a slip of white wing thread. At the head end of the thorax tie the silver fly.

Take the wing thread to the hook and tie a length of about four

Wrap the white thread around the hook about 1/4 inch from the thorax. Fill the thorax with two turns of the ribbing thread. Tie the tail on or near and cut across the surplus in the middle point. Tie a few strands of peacock tail feather.

4.

Select two white-winged feather quills and tie them to the eye of the hook. Complete the fly with a white fly and a small, light-colored fly. Cockle feathers are also optional on the fly.

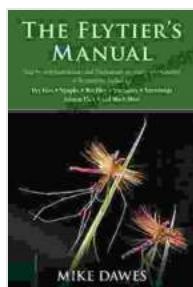

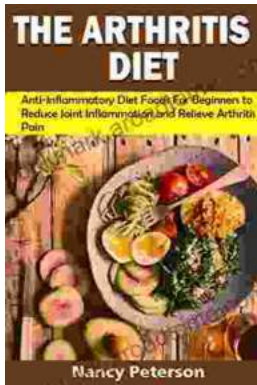

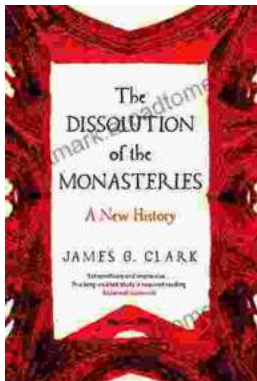
